A classic of its genre and the most popular play by one of Britain's most successful twentieth century playwriters.

The play takes place over the course of 2 years just prior to the First World War. Ronnie Winslow, *The Winslow Boy*, is expelled from Naval College for stealing a postal order, despite him insisting his innocence. Denied the right of appeal his father Arthur takes up a prolonged action against the Admiralty, Judiciary and ultimately the British Establishment, demanding that his son receives a fair hearing. The course of events undermines Arthur's health, and costs his family their financial security and societal status. Arthur receives the indefatigable support of his daughter Catherine and the not-insubstantial expertise of barrister Sir Robert Morton, who's motivation throughout is that "right is done".

The play is a fascinating exploration of Edwardian family loyalties, women, patriarchy, principles and sacrifice, culminating with a satisfying feel-good factor.

CHARACTER DESCRIPTIONS:

ARTHUR WINSLOW - 60

Family patriarch. Man of principal when principals were all important. Product of a Victorian upbringing now struggling to maintain social status in a changing Edwardian landscape. Deteriorating health during the course of the play.

GRACE WINSLOW - 50s

Arthur's supportive wife whose patience deteriorates as the cost of her husband's principled action takes its toll on the family's status and finances.

CATHERINE WINSLOW - Late 20s

Suffragist matriarchal daughter and family lynchpin. Central character through much of the play, she is motivated as much by grievances with intransigent Edwardian scruples as familial loyalties.

DICKIE WINSLOW - Early 20s

Mildly feckless and frivolous elder son, his failing University career is curtailed by the families worsening financial straits.

RONNIE WINSLOW - 14 at the beginning to 16 at conclusion

Eponymous "Winslow Boy", expelled from Naval College for stealing. Fearful of his father but honest and straightforward in his interactions.

SIR ROBERT MORTON - 40s

High-flying barrister and opposition Member of Parliament, he takes up the brief of defending Ronnie. Initially mistrusted by Catherine, who disagrees with his politics and suspects his motivation to be self-serving, he earns her respect through selflessly arguing the family's case.

DESMOND CURRY - 40s

Family solicitor unrequitedly in love with Catherine.

JOHN WATHERSTONE - 30

Catherine's fiancé motivated by the social mores of the period and anxious to preserve financial security.

VIOLET - 50+

Elderly maid of 24 years standing. Treated informally as a member of the family.

MISS BARNES - 40

Lady reporter at a time when journalism was dominated by men.
